Laud HA Caretaker for Fire Heroics That Brought Family, Dog to Safety

A veteran Housing Authority employee was honored by city and state lawmakers after savin people and a dog from an apartment fire in The Bronx this summer.

Ivan Maestre, a caretaker at NYCHA's Claremont Rehab development, and a six-year vetera the department, grew up in the authority's Saint Mary's Park houses, and has three siblings an uncle who also work for NYCHA.

'There Must Be a Fire'

He was making his usual rounds through the Claremont development sometime after noon Aug. 2.

"I was in the basement filling up the bucket with water so I could do the mopping," he said, he heard a commotion above him. "It sounded like glass popping and I knew there must be fire."

His first instinct was to alert the tenants. "I was running and shouting and banging on doors maniac," he said.

He said he was afraid the fire would reach one of the building's gas lines, and cause the brownstone to explode. "I've seen too many stories like that," he said.

Mr. Maestre said a few construction workers who were outside joined him as he raced to the second floor.

But when they reached the third floor, they were confronted with a cloud of thick smoke fror third-floor apartment where the fire had started.

"I told the people that were with me to go back downstairs and I kicked in the door to see if was anyone there," he said.

Getting no response, Mr. Maestre ran up to the fourth floor, where he knew there was a familia new baby and a dog.

"I pounded on their door and told them not to open it because there was a fire downstairs, a head to the fire escape," he said. He then ran to the roof and climbed down the fire escape family's apartment.

"They opened the window and climbed out and I helped them down," he said. "It was hard because some of them were scared of heights."

Mr. Maestre's actions saved four adults, a two-week-old infant, and the family dog.

They also won him accolades and proclamations from City Council Member Vanessa Gibso state Assemblywoman Latoya Joyner, and a spot as the face of the agency's "I Am NextGeneration NYCHA" campaign.

"We were so happy to hear about what he had done," said NYCHA spokeswoman Crystal V "We thought he was a perfect example of the values we're promoting through NextGen NYC

"I'm deeply honored," Mr. Maestre said of all the praise he's received. "It's a good feeling, b really don't feel like I did anything heroic."
